A WORD FROM YOUR STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

The last couple of weeks we have had members of the congregation share their thoughts on Stewardship. What is the difference between Fundraising and Stewardship, or are they the same? According to Webster's Dictionary Fundraising is the activity done to collect money for a political party, charity, school, etc., whereas Stewardship reaches beyond the horizon of

fundraising precisely because it is the working of the Holy Spirit within a person of faith. Rather than voluntary response to an appeal (Fundraising), Stewardship is spiritual discipline, forged in the desire to follow Christ. Instead of serving the self or ego in the response to Fundraising, Stewardship lives in the service of faith.

We understand that for many, tithing is a very difficult goal. The important thing is that you start somewhere, that your giving be in proportion to your income, that your giving reflects an appropriate offering to God given your means, and that your offerings express both your desire to serve the Lord and invest in God's work. If you are not yet tithing, consider taking a step toward tithing this year. For example, if you now give 3% of your income, consider increasing your gift to 4%, and add 1% per year until you reach the tithing goal. Our prayer is that everyone will grow in their faith through giving financially to the ministries of Northwest United Protestant Church.

We ask that you return you Estimate of Giving Card as soon as you can. There are two reasons why we ask every member of the Northwest family return these cards. First, the process of prayerfully asking God to guide your decision and then making a commitment to serve the Lord with your financial gifts is an act of worship, an expression of gratitude and praise to God. Secondly, on a more practical note, your commitment allows Northwest United Protestant Church to budget and better plan for our ministries, key objectives, obligations.

As of October 29th, the stewardship drive has provided about 40% of our budget. The Stewardship drive will continue for another two weeks (until Nov. 16th) at which time the Church Board will need to review the Estimates of Giving against the proposed budget. Thanks go to Brad Butherus, Jim Jewett, and Jan Hansens for their meditations.

Thank you for your prayerful consideration of this note. Thank you and God bless each of you.

RECYCLING OPPORTUNITIES @ YOUR CHURCH

The church participates in Richland's curbside recycling program. The following items can be placed in the blue bin located next to the shed by the Education Building.

Paper/Cardboard—newspaper, catalogs, phonebooks, printer paper, junk mail, greeting cards, flattened pressboard boxes, cores from paper towels and wrapping paper.

Metal—tin and aluminum cans, small metal.

Plastic—containers with a neck smaller than the base and the number 1 thru 7 on the bottom. No clear cups, pill bottles, butter or yogurt tubs.

What is <u>not</u> acceptable? Glass, food waste, dirty or unsanitary items or containers, batteries, plastic bags (<u>please remove</u>), hazardous waste, light bulbs, or aerosol cans.


