Our lives are full of change. It's simply the way life is. Think back at the changes you've seen in your lifetime. Who would have thought, just fifty years ago, that we would have an African-American president? Who would have thought, just twenty years ago, that same-sex marriage would be legal

across the country? Who would have thought, just ten years ago, that we would carry "smart phones" in our pockets, little rectangles that each have more computing power than NASA used to send Neil Armstrong to the moon? And think about all the changes in your life...marriages, divorces, children, grandchildren, deaths, births.

The church changes too, and it does so for several reasons. Sometimes the church changes in response to financial and other practical concerns. Sometimes the church changes in response to a changing culture; while the good news of Christ doesn't change, the **way** the church **shares** that news with the world must. And sometimes the church changes because the wind of the Holy Spirit blows through our midst, calling us to new and sometimes scary things.

There are a lot of changes in the wind right now at Northwest Church. We have a new Music Director. We have an Interim Pastor. Church room usage has been shifting recently, and will likely shift more in the coming year. And we are at the crux of our Visioning process as we prepare together to identify **a Vision** for our congregation in coming years. Depending on what Vision statement is developed on March 30, there may be more subtle, or even large, changes coming down the road with the call of a settled pastor.

Change can be scary, especially when that change feels like a loss of control for us. I want you to know a few things about all of these changes.

First, all the changes happening now are **not** some sort of coordinated effort to accomplish something specific. They're not pieces of some big plan. In fact, most of them have been percolating for a while, some for several years. They just happen to be bearing fruit at the same time!


Second, our **guiding principles** can help us act in appropriate ways during changes, and can also help us make good decisions about where to go.

And **Third**, while things change all around us, **the love of God through Christ never changes**. Whatever we experience, whatever good and bad changes occur in our lives, Christ never leaves our side, even if he sometimes seems to be hidden. While I don't believe that "everything happens for a reason," I do believe that God can bring good out of anything, and that God is absolutely with us in every season, every moment, every day, whatever those days may bring.



The Truro Bear and Other Adventures

by Mary Oliver


Mary Oliver was an American poet who won the National Book Award and a Pulitzer Prize. She was far and away America's best selling poet. She and her companion Molly Cook lived in Provincetown Massachusetts for 40 years. The town and the surrounding countryside were the inspiration for many of her poems and essays.

Ms. Oliver teaches us the magic and beauty of the natural world with her joyous and intimate observations of animal, plants, rocks and landscapes. She was able to find and proclaim the sacred and spiritual in nature in an extraordinary manner.

Ms. Oliver died in January 2019 in Florida. She wrote 17 books of poetry and 5 books of prose.

Here is an example of part of one of her poems:

"... I don't know exactly what a prayer is. I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down into the grass. how to kneel down in the grass. how to be idle and blessed, how to stroll through the fields, which is what I have been doing all day. Tell me, what else should I have done? Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon? Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?"



SHORT STORIES BY JESUS:

<u>The Enigmatic Parables</u> of a Controversial Rabbi

Join Jennifer Jacobson for a six-week study of the Parables of Jesus Thursdays after Choir Rehearsal at 6:30 beginning March 7th.


Amy-Jill Levine, the renowned biblical scholar, author of *The Misunderstood Jew*, and general editor for *The Jewish Annotated New Testament* interweaves history and spiritual analysis to explore Jesus' most popular teaching parables,

exposing their misinterpretations and making them lively and relevant for modern readers.

Jesus was a skilled storyteller and perceptive teacher who used parables from everyday life to effectively convey his message and meaning. Life in first-century Palestine was very different from our world today, and many traditional interpretations of Jesus' stories ignore this disparity and have often allowed anti-Semitism and misogyny to color their perspectives.

In this wise, entertaining, and educational book, Amy-Jill Levine offers a fresh, timely reinterpretation of Jesus' narratives. In *Short Stories by Jesus*, she analyzes these "problems with parables," taking readers back in time to understand how their original Jewish audience understood them. Levine reveals the parables' connections to first-century economic and agricultural life, social customs and morality, Jewish scriptures and Roman culture. With this revitalized understanding, she interprets these moving stories for the contemporary reader, showing how the parables are not just about Jesus, but are also about us—and when read rightly, still challenge and provoke us two thousand years later.

CAROLL GROW, HARVEST, PREPARE, SHARE

Part of our preparation for search and call of a new settled minister is to dream big dreams. Where do we want to be as a community in Christ in five years? In ten years? How do we understand our specific mission to ministry with and for the people of Northwest Church and of our city? The folks who gathered after worship on January 13th had some creative and inspired ideas.

My favorite is the brainstorming around hosting a "dinner church" service at an alternate time, recognizing many people working in businesses do not have the luxury of taking Sunday morning off. Perhaps on a Sunday evening or Saturday morning or maybe a week night – gather together and make a simple healthy meal – perhaps soup and a salad, maybe a pasta dish– and share in song and scripture, a mediation and the holy meal our Lord commanded us to share together as often as we meet. Jesus and his disciples spent a lot of his ministry around food, eating with his friends and feeding people. NWUP Church is good at feeding people too. This seems like a logical extension of our response to the Gospel.

Our focus on food in the brainstorming conversation led to imagining the development of an extensive garden on church property that would grow the food we serve at our dinners, that could also be distributed to people in need. Or that could have a

section of plots leased out to local families to tend for themselves. From there we spun out the "what if" to include Chickens! Fresh eggs from the five chickens the City of Richland would allow.

How could we develop this beautiful (delicious?) idea into a sustainable ministry? Functionally, I suggest we would need a Master Gardener, a minister gardener? There are education classes available to teach us what we need to know about growing food in the city. Supplies and training cost money. Moving forward if we want to explore the possibility of this Garden Ministry Expansion, we would probably need to secure grants, or special offering, or some other means of amassing the "seed money."

This *Garden to Table* ministry has sparked my theological imagination. Our spiritual journey is one from the Garden of Eden at Creation to Christ's Table. Humanity has been entrusted with the care of God's Creation. Eco-Theologian Sallie McFague envisions incarnation in terms of the entirety of God's creation, not just humanity. All that exists – the entire Universe - has been created out of God's imagination. Everything reflects the beauty of our God. Humanity, rather than existing apart from the rest of creation, alone in God's favor, with the resources of this world to use as we will, is reframed as part of the whole, entrusted with its maintenance and care. McFague writes of this world as our home. This is the Home God has created for us and called good. And she suggests some house rules like those you might find on the fridge in your kitchen: Take only your share. Clean up after yourself. Leave the house in good condition for future generations.

I would suggest one additional component of our big "garden to table, dinner church, feed the neighborhood" dream: Becoming a certified Green Chalice Ministry. Take a peek at the program on the Disciple's home missions page on the internet. https://www.discipleshomemissions.org/missions-advocacy/green-chalice/green-chalice-program/. Think about it. Let's talk.


