In January 2020, I accepted the call to be the new pastor at Northwest United Protestant Church. As I prepared for a new ministry, I gathered books and articles on how to begin a new call successfully. I underlined pertinent passages and outlined my first three months. My family's move across the country went well and we settled in Richland with great anticipation. I was eager to get to know this church and this community. Of course, none of us could envision how 2020 would unfold. All my books and seminary education could not have prepared me for the

pandemic. My first Sunday, March 22, 2020, was online, streaming from my home on Facebook. No seminary class ever prepared me for such a scenario.

I could not have served as pastor during 2020 without the support of the wonderful congregation at NWUP. The resilient spirit and the willingness to try new ways of being church was (and continues to be) refreshing. Even in the middle of lockdown, NWUP was able to continue to worship. Some highlights of 2020 help underscore how caring and devoted this congregation is and how it continues to live out its vision statement: "Loving and serving Christ in our community and world." In 2020 I provided pastoral leadership in several ways:

- ❖ Began online worship through Facebook and YouTube.
- Created drive-in worship during the summer months and provided a new way to safely gather.
- Celebrated my installation during a drive-in service in August.
- ❖ Helped select and purchase new sound equipment for the drive-in service.
- Held weekly meetings with the moderator, Anna Kion.
- ❖ Taught several Bible studies on Zoom.
- Helped move commission meetings and board meetings to an online platform (Zoom).
- ❖ Participated in weekly regional clergy meetings for support and to learn how other congregations were dealing with the pandemic, with Rev. Sandy Messick, regional minister for the Northern Lights region.
- Updated the church's Facebook page and website, and currently, maintain it by posting inspirational messages and information that is helpful to our members.

- Supported the music ministry of the church and helped restart the handbell choir.
- Increased the communication with the congregation through a weekly pastoral letter and sending out a copy of the sermon and weekly bulletin.
- Encouraged the congregation through pastoral calls.

Through all this, I have continued my Doctor of Ministry studies at Phillips Theological Seminary. These classes have been challenging, but I love to learn, so I am energized with each class. Fortunately, all classes have been online, and my time away from the congregation during these intensive classes has been minimized. I am currently a third of the way through the doctoral program.

It has been a difficult, but exciting year, one that I could never have prepared sufficiently for. The church has been challenged, especially financially. I still struggle with finding ways to reach the people that cannot log on through Zoom or find us on Facebook. I worry that some people will not come back. But through it all, I have learned to depend on God for guidance and wisdom, and courage. I have leaned heavily on the scripture from the book of Esther, "And who knows but that you have come to your... position for such a time as this?" (Esther 4:14)

I am grateful for the opportunity to serve as pastor at NWUP. It has been a blessing to be in ministry with this caring and loving congregation and I look forward to doing great things for God in 2021.

Moderator Report

As we look back on the past year of 2020, we realize all the changes that have occurred in the life of Northwest United Protestant Church as a result of the Corona-19 Virus Pandemic. We said good-bye to our Supply pastor and welcomed our new pastor just as we had to close the doors to the church due to the Pandemic. We went from planning for services in Lent with All Saints Church to stopping all in-door church services. We began streaming services ahead of time to be shown on-line on Sundays. In the summer we instituted

Drive-in services with some of the congregation in cars and others throughout the United States able to watch it on-line at home. In October we were finally able to have limited indoor seating for worship services while live-streaming the service to those in our community who were required to stay at

home because of the pandemic.

Our rental groups including the Early Learning Co-op were required to shut down their meetings in the early Spring as well. The Board had previously increased the monthly fees for the rental groups other than Early Learning Co-op. When the rental groups were allowed to return to the church in late Fall, new use agreements were prepared for each group reflecting the increase in the rental fee and providing for updated language to cover the new Covid-19 Requirements from the Center for Disease Control, the State of Washington Health Department and the Benton Franklin County Health Department.

Our new Pastor, Miriam Gentle, was installed as our Settled Pastor on August 23, 2020. Pastor Gentle arrived at the beginning of the pandemic and one of her first tasks was to close the church. She immediately started our live streaming services which have reached many homes across the nation and have been well received by all. Pastor Gentle conducted Zoom Bible Studies throughout the year which were very well attended and received by our congregation and others.

Our Board, the Elders, and a number of the commissions have continued to meet during the year using Zoom. The business was carried out efficiently and effectively. Our commission members transferred to Zoom meetings with little or no effort and

continued with the business of the church. A Covid-19 Committee was named in late Spring. Their first task was to prepare a Covid-19 Exposure Control, Mitigation, and Recovery Plan. The plan has been updated several times over the year to include the changes that were made by the CDC, State of Washington, and Benton Franklin County Health Departments. This committee also prepared the church sanctuary for occupancy once we were allowed to start up live services again.

Deb Donahoe, our Co-Moderator, moved to Michigan in late October. We have truly missed her. In her absence, the undersigned agreed to continue one more year as the Moderator. This will be my third and final year per The Blue Book.

2020 has been a challenge for all of us but we have been Blessed with our ability to be creative and to have weekly worship services throughout the year. In 2021 may we continue to work together to bring God's love into the world.

When asked, Tammy Neslin graciously agreed to step in and finish her term. Interim Pastor Peter Kalunian attended meetings from January through March. Pastor

Miriam Gentle attended March through December.

Needless to say, this has been quite a year that got turned upside down with the arrival of the Covid-19 Pandemic. Our new Pastor Miriam Gentle and husband Stephen arrived in Richland the week everything changed. She visited the Elder's March meeting merely to observe and meet us. Little did we know that our Interim Pastor, Peter Kalunian would be unable to be there for his last Sunday on March 15th. When Miriam was informed on a Friday, she volunteered to preach her first sermon.

Miriam was completely proactive in realizing NWUP needed to continue with church services online. With encouragement and support from leaders of our congregation, plus using Steve's iPhone, the church managed to successfully post live the first Sunday, March 22nd. It was posted and services continue on Facebook and the Northwest United Protestant Church website as well as YouTube. The Elders continued recording prayers for the services. As the weather warmed we began to hold services in the church parking lot. The chill of Fall arrived and once again we returned with safe distancing into the sanctuary thus continuing to give prayers in celebration of The Lords Supper.

In April the Elders began holding their meeting via Zoom. What follows is a brief list of the Elder's meeting agendas and activities:

We met the second week of each month. We began each meeting in a prayerful or inspirational and supportive way. Shared concerns and joys of contact with friends in our congregation were shared and held in prayer.

- In preparation for Miriam and Stephen's arrival, we spearheaded "The Pounding," which was a donation of mainly food items to stock their home when they arrived.
- We created a Calling Tree divided among the Elders and Sue Jewett to keep in touch with families in our congregation.
- ❖ We put together Advent bags for every family in our congregation and delivered them to their homes before Christmas.
- ❖ In November Miriam presented a program on the Role of the Elders in the Disciples of Christ Church. Essentially we are teachers, shepherds, and visionaries with a calling to pray in all circumstances.



Diaconate



Northwest United Protestant Church operated in its normal fashion for Deacons for the first two to three months of 2020. Then, with the impact of the Covid-19 Virus Pandemic, the church was shut down for normal services. For several months, there were only virtual services and the deacons did not participate. In June, the church was able to hold outdoor services (in the parking lot) and the deacons provided support by providing bulletins and communion supplies to people arriving in their automobiles and collecting offerings and supplies for the

Food Bank and Hospital/Emergency personnel who were working to support the community minimize the spread of the Pandemic. As a result of the Pandemic, many deacons chose not to serve.

In July, a Covid-19 Exposure Control, Mitigation and Recovery Plan for Northwest United Protestant Church, consistent with the State of Washington and Benton/Franklin County Health District requirements, was developed. Under these requirements, deacons were not required. Instead, a Greeter and two Ushers were assigned to each service.

In early October, indoor services were authorized. The sanctuary was set up and marked to ensure proper social distancing following the requirements. The Greeter is required to wear a mask and gloves and hand out communion elements, bulletins, masks (if necessary) and verify the member does not have symptoms of the virus. The Ushers wearing gloves and masks, then escort the member into the sanctuary, seating them in a manner to ensure proper social distancing.

Trustees Report




Changes to our user agreements required by the Covid-19 Pandemic and an increase in rates required revision to 5 of our user agreements with outside organizations. They were reviewed and signed by the trustee(s) including one for Tops Weight Loss Program and one for Flourish Mid-Columbia, a faith-based non-profit. Also, a new copier was purchased by the church and a contract closeout for the old copier and a contract

for the new copier were reviewed and signed by the trustee(s).

As a result of a theft of items in the shed, the church insurance policy was changed. The deductible for all church property was reduced from \$5,000 to \$1,000 and the amount of property coverage in the shed was raised from \$5,000 to \$10,000.00

Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, our timeshare in Hawaii was not used in 2020. Instead, we were allowed to internally bank the week's stay and will have a second week that can be used within the next two years (2021, 2022).

The fiscal year for the church is January 1st thru
December 31st. 2020. It was an interesting year for
NWUP Church due to COVID-19. We began the first
two months with an interim pastor. Then were blessed
with our full-time pastor, Miriam Gentle.

NWUP changed our outsourced professional bookkeeping services from Veronica Salazar, BillaBillz, to Teri Galloway, Balanced Books. This was a

mutually agreed-upon change between the Stewardship and Finance Committee and our pastor.

<u>Income</u>- Total actual operating income was \$ 150,322 compared to a planned income budget of \$ 160,360. Income was \$10,038 less than budgeted.

Expenses - Actual expenses were \$ 141,426.

Net income - Annual total income exceeded expenses by \$8,895.

<u>Current Assets</u>- The table below shows our Savings/Checking and Total Assets. The amount in Savings/Checking has diminished due to increased expenses from Interim Pastor to Full-time Pastor.

In 2017 the decision was made to add the value of the church buildings and land as assets. Reporting- The church treasurer prepares a monthly status report with the balance sheet, profit & loss statement, and budget report to the Stewardship and Finance Committee monthly. The same report is also presented to the monthly Church Board meetings. The reports are prepared with the assistance of our professional bookkeeper.

<u>Regulatory Reporting</u>- All necessary payments and reporting for employment taxes are taken care of via QuickBooks, by the bookkeeper. Copies of such reports are kept with each month's reports.

The annual report to the WA Secretary of State for 2020 was submitted in January 2021 for NWUP Nonprofit Annual Report and with the Department of Revenue for NWUP Nonprofit Property Tax Exemption for 2020.

- During Advent, we made some children's Advent bags. They had a bag for coloring, ornaments, special coloring ornaments, devotional, and more.
- We sent out Advent bible study bulletins in a letter to all the children age 10 and under.

Hospitality Commission

Given that 2020 was the year of the Pandemic, Hospitality was restricted from hosting the usual events during the church year. However, before the start of the Pandemic in January, we helped celebrate Epiphany with cupcakes (a dime in each one) for Coffee Hour. This was a custom of our previous Interim Pastor. A Special Coffee Hour was held for Rick Donahoe at the finish of his Internship with NWUP Church.

During the Pandemic, a "Baby Shower" was held for Cassandra Humphrys. Church members sent in money and a gift was ordered and sent to her. Some members chose to send her cards and gift cards as well.

Shortly after the Pandemic shutdown, the fridges in the church kitchen and the Education building were cleaned out and all food items were removed.

This past year under the restraints of the Covid 19 Pandemic, the Personnel Commission found the need to be innovative and flexible. When the Governor closed all meeting areas our church set about conducting online services for the congregation. The downside of these actions was that there was no need for a Nursery Attendant. At the time, it was unknown how long all of this might last. It was decided to

continue the weekly payment to our hired attendant for the short term in hopes that the meeting ban would be short-lived. When an opportunity to apply for an assistance loan from the government to help with salaries became available it was applied for and the funds helped keep the attendant salary going. In August after months of closure, it was decided to suspend the payment of the weekly salary until things improved.

When the weather improved enough in the Spring, services moved from strictly online to the church parking lot as well as online. To facilitate this a mobile sound system was purchased to allow those in their cars to easily hear the service. It soon evolved to a point where a dedicated sound operator seemed appropriate due to the complexity of the sound system. Aydia O'Hara was contacted and asked if she would be interested in becoming a paid operator for the system. She expressed interest and was ultimately hired to do the job. In mid-October, services moved indoors to the sanctuary and the new sound system was set up there. Aydia was interested in remaining as the sound operator and has been doing the job every Sunday since.

With the addition of Aydia O'Hara, the church currently has three employees, Erica Nunez, Church Secretary/Administrative Assistant, Sue Lincoln, Church Musician, and Aydia O'Hara, Sound Technician.

I have been acting Personnel Commission Chair for over a year and have been interested in passing this duty on to a fellow congregant for several months. I asked Dalene Zabel if she would be interested in the position and she said yes. Thus, she has taken over officially as of the first of this calendar year and I have full confidence that she will provide excellent leadership and guidance for the commission.


Property Commission

The following projects were completed in 2020. Early in the year, the Week of Compassion was observed with special offerings. During the Spring/Summer, the Food Bank (Richland Facility) was provided 450+ pounds of

food to be used in our local community. Again in the Fall, our congregation provided Jefferson School gift card donations for Back to School to help the families purchase the supplies and equipment that they would need at home for homeschooling.

For Christmas Social Concerns sponsored Samaritan's Purse, to provide Operation Christmas Child gift boxes for kids at Christmas. The Mitten Tree at Christmas came out again for Christmas. Social Concerns coordinated with the Prayer Shawls Group to knit hats and mittens for the World Relief of the Tri-Cities. Twenty-six hats and twenty-five pairs of mittens were delivered to World Relief.

As usual, congregational members initiated several short projects throughout the year which benefitted our community. Examples include Snacks for Kadlec staff during the long hours they worked to support members of our community during the Pandemic, used eyeglasses for AmigoVision, calendars for World Relief, and books for inmates.

In the summer, Candace Rawlings was added as co-chair and will become Chair of this Commission in 2021.

- Handbell choir performed during Advent and Christmas.







Food 4 Friends

Like many other programs at NWUP Food 4 Friends, looked very different in 2020. We were able to meet for a couple of months to cook and deliver meals to our friends before we had to begin safety protocols. Being safe, keeping others safe, became the mantra. And for a few months, we didn't know if our food and brown bags were safe so we waited and watched with the world. In July when Sunday worship services moved

from online to the parking lot we all cooked remotely and met outside to load our bags of love. 
